Pulmonic Stenosis in Dogs

What dogs get this disease? This congenital disorder is most often identified in brachyocephalic (e.g. bulldogs, Boston terriers), terriers (Jack Russel terriers), Samoyeds, and Labrador retrievers. Other breeds can also be affected such as boxers and Newfoundlands.

CAUSE: Pulmonic stenosis is a congenital heart defect of the semilunar valve that is between the right ventricle and the pulmonary artery (great vessel that takes blood to the lungs). The leaflets of this valve are thickened and/or partially fused together. Sometimes the supporting structure known as the annulus is also narrow. Dogs that have this congenital defect have a wide range of stenosis to include very mild to severe obstruction to blood flow from the heart to the lungs. This defect may be associated with other congenital defects too (e.g. ventricular septal defect, overriding aorta, subaortic stenosis). Because this disease is associated with certain breeds it is likely that it is at least in part due to a mutation in as yet unidentified gene.

CLINICAL SIGNS: Many dogs have no clinical signs. Dogs with mild disease never develop any problems and may live a normal lifespan. However, dogs with advanced disease may have exercise intolerance, collapsing, arrhythmias, or heart failure.

DIAGNOSIS: Virtually all dogs with clinically important pulmonic stenosis will have a cardiac murmur heard when the chest is listened to with a stethoscope. This is auscultation of the chest. Often, but not always, how loud the murmur is in this particular disease correlates with severity. An important example of the exception to this general statement is with tetralogy of Fallot where several congenital defects are present together with pulmonic stenosis.

• *Radiography and angiocardiography*. Radiographs which are made with x-rays provide information regarding the size and shape of the silhouette of the heart. Angiocardiography is a type of radiography whereby contrast (dye) is injected into the vasculature to see the stenosis. This is most often done at the time of treatment using balloon valvuloplasty.

• *Echocardiography* An important diagnostic tool to fully characterize the structure and function of the pulmonic valve and the support structures involves the ultrasound of the heart known as echocardiography. This test permits the examination not only of the muscle and valve, but also of the blood flow (*Doppler echocardiography*). Determination of the blood flow across the stenotic valve is important to learn the severity of the pulmonic stenosis because this guides the recommendations for treatment. The cardiologist will be able to determine the gradient across the stenotic valve. This is usually the first parameter used to decide if the dog requires treatment with balloon valvuloplasty. In most cases dogs with a gradient above 80 mmHg are recommended to have treatment when the stenosis is primarily valvular. Dogs with a gradient of less than 50 mmHg do not usually require treatment. When the gradient is in the middle, other factors are taken into consideration for the next step towards or away from the catheter procedure.



Pulmonic Stenosis in Dogs, continued ...

• *Electrocardiography* An electrocardiogram (ECG) may be performed to further characterize dogs with pulmonic stenosis; however, this test is usually not as important as the physical examination, radiograph, and echocardiogram. Other tests may be ordered to determine the status of other body systems and to insure that all are functioning adequately.

TREATMENT: Balloon valvuloplasty is the treatment used for valvular pulmonic stenosis. Not every dog with this defect can be helped by this procedure. Some dogs have dramatic improvement while others have adequate results. Echocardiographic examination can give indicators of dogs that are most likely to be helped. This treatment involves the passage under general anesthesia of special catheters which when an attached balloon is inflated, tears the restricted valve leaflets. Measurements of the pressure gradient before and after treatment give information as to the success of the treatment. This treatment involves specialized training of the veterinary cardiologists and the use of expensive specifically ordered catheters for each patient. Our service has published several manuscripts concerning the treatment of pulmonic stenosis. Some dogs may be treated with beta-adrenergic blockers (e.g. atenolol) either with or without the balloon valvuloplasty.



PROGNOSIS: The prognosis depends on the severity of the disease and the response to treatment.

How should an affected dog be monitored? The frequency and intensity of the monitoring depends on each patient, the severity of the disease, the response to treatment, and the status of other body systems. Usually after the balloon valvuloplasty a dog is examined 3 months later and then yearly.

GOOD DOG TRAINING CORNER

Patience

So often I receive questions on training that begin with "I've tried everything and my dog just won't ..." My answer is always the same -"Either what you are asking is impossible for the dog, or you haven't been patient". Patience is the most important skill in training our dogs, because animals learn behaviors in tiny steps. You can explain to a human the steps involved in learning to read for instance -i.e. memorize the alphabet, learn the sounds for each letter, learn to blend sounds, learn to recognize sight words, learn to read fluently. A human can understand that the long range goal is reading, and that they must master each step before moving on to the next. We sometimes forget that a dog cannot understand what the final goal will be. For him, each step IS the goal, and when he sits instead of lays down, he has no idea why we are frustrated. When he "stays" for one second and then moves, he has mastered the "stay" command in his mind and should be rewarded. We cannot explain to him that "stay" means hold that position for as long as your human wants you to, which can vary from two seconds to ten minutes.

The more we can learn to see training from the dog's perspective, the better trainers we will become. Each new behavior has to be broken down into the smallest of steps, and each step mastered before we move on to asking for more complicated behaviors. This takes patience. The most common mistake we make is to become hurried, and this only confuses the dog and extends the time needed to train. In the picture, you see Jack calmly skate-boarding across the Verizon Center in front of a huge crowd. What you don't see, are the numerous steps it took to achieve this behavior. We began when Jack was 8 weeks old, and a year later, he's half way to his goal. Our next goal is to t each him to push himself. You have to anticipate what can go wrong in training, and ensure that your dog avoids those pitfalls. For Jack, we did not want him to step off the board, fall off the board, decide when and where he would end his ride, pay attention to the audience or to the television cameras. He could not turn when someone yelled his name (paparazzi trying for a face shot) or become distracted by balloons, balls, costumed mascots etc. To ensure this goal, we developed a very detailed plan so that he could master each skill independently. We have all experienced this with our own dogs, when they will listen perfectly to a command at home, but lose all knowledge when at the dog park.

The key to success is training a dog "TO do something", not training a dog "NOT to do something". We trained Jack TO look for his handler, which avoided him looking at any distraction. He is TO stay on the board, which prevented getting off the board. The key to success was to break it down into seconds - he was rewarded for staying on the board one second, then getting off. Two seconds, then off. If he ever got off on his own, we restarted from the beginning, so it was clear that rewards only came from exact behavior. Often times at home, we tell a dog to stay, and then reward him when he decides to break the stay, thinking that he was good for holding it however long he did. It's important to reward a dog while he's actually doing the behavior you want, not after he stops performing the trick. Remember the key is timing and patience. With these two skills almost anything is possible.
